Survival skills for new graduates

We start in Yorkshire, with a session on Survival Skills. Our inspiration comes from the RAF, NASA and Formula One: all high pressure, demanding situations requiring clear thinking and a calm approach.



Driver Skills

A bespoke driving skills session including practical driving skills and a 'skid pan experience'. At the end of this you will have:

- Developed skid control and avoidance skills, including how forward planning and tactical driving can be used to help.
- Benefited from one-to-one driving assessment and advice.
- Received training to improve awareness and develop a positive attitude and aptitude for driving at work and beyond.

Farm Survival Skills

Achieve better clinical outcomes, improve confidence, reduce stress and minimise the risk of accidents on farm. At the end of this you will:

- Be better equipped to manage challenging situations on farm.
- Have acquired techniques to aid decision-making under pressure.
- Understand new ways to communicate more effectively with your farm clients.
- Be able to minimise the risks of potential accidents on farm.

Thriving in Farm Practice

At the end of this module you will gain:

- An understanding of your own personality and others around you, as well as how to build successful work relationships.
- Skills to manage difficult situations in practice including;
 - An understanding of the importance, challenges and some solutions to maintaining a healthy work-life balance.
 - Communication skills to deal with the situations you may face during your first few years in practice.

Mastering Medicines

This session will equip graduates on a practical level with the confidence and knowledge to be able to work actively with farmers to help them to use medicines more effectively.

- Explore critical issues relating to veterinary antimicrobial use:
 - 'One Medicine'.
 - Key antimicrobial resistance (AMR) across the species.
- Understand core pharmacological principles and how these relate to both treatment efficacy and resistance development.
- Identify key barriers and the practical considerations regarding best practice principles.
- Understand key components required to achieve improvements at practice level and be aware of the options to achieve them.



Pigs and Poultry

This session provides a starting point by introducing an awareness of common disease problems in pigs and poultry and how to manage them.

This session will help you identify the major disease-causing agents in poultry and pigs.

Practical knowledge of the following systems and diseases in poultry:

- Respiratory system (IB, Mycoplasma, ORT, Aspergillosis).
- Gastrointestinal system (Coccidiosis, worms, Enteritis).
- Leg problems (growth abnormalities, litter problems, Mycoplasma).
- External parasite infestations (lice, red mite).
- Reproductive system (egg drops, pale egg shells).

Explaining the development of the disease process in pigs and the how and why to manage and medicate them:

- Have you seen Greasy Pig, Erysipelas, Mange and worms?
- Other common presentations from scour to sunburn.
- Biosecurity and notifiable diseases.

Dairy Days

Delivered in the dairy rich county of Dorset, on farm and in classroom sessions, the three day dairy module will cement clinical knowledge and develop key practical skills to extend service satisfaction for dairy clients from our new graduates.



Calving cows, down cows and surgery

- Safe handling of animals.
- Calving the cow:
 - Common presentations.
 - Effective techniques to improve ease of calving.
 - Understanding the importance of appropriate communication throughout the process.
 - Post calving uterine health.
- Down cows.

How to make a diagnosis and test appropriately, then discuss treatment options, prognosis and nursing care with the farmer:

- Clinical approach.
- Effective communication of likely outcomes.
- Ancillary tests and best practice treatments.
- Surgery – an approach to common situations:
 - Aim to understand the correct equipment needed.
 - Practical anaesthesia – where to clip and inject.
 - Cutting and stitching – practical use of cadaver material.

The farm: transition management

- The transition period (3 weeks pre to 3 weeks post calving)
 - Common problems: down cows, milk fever, ketosis, metritis, LDA.
- The energy deficient cow – how to spot it and how to treat it.
- Displaced abomasums – different approaches to treatment and correction.
- Milk fever – treatment approaches and prevention.
- Understand when and how to ask for a second opinion.
- Understanding the importance of, and how to build good rapport with clients.
- Understanding of communication patterns and how language affects outcome.

The cow: lameness identification and first aid treatment

- Identify lame cows and recognise which cows need immediate attention.
- Use facilities available to lift and inspect the foot with regard to safety for the vet and the cow.
- Identify the source of the lameness problem and take action to stop the 'disease process' progressing.

Beef and Sheep Skills

Our highly experienced veterinary trainers will take our graduates through how to approach and manage common problems in beef and sheep – applicable for any farm system.



Beef

- Kit and how to use it.
- Key topics to diagnose, treat and prevent:
 - Pneumonia outbreak.
 - Neonatal calf scour.
 - Sudden death/scouring suckled calves.
 - Worming protocols.
- Infertility/tightening the calving pattern.
- Practical tips on managing difficult C-sections.

Sheep

- Kit and how to use it.
- Key topics to diagnose, treat and prevent:
 - Low scanning percentage.
 - Lamb losses.
 - Lameness.
 - Thin ewes.
 - Parasite endo and ecto.
 - Abortion.

Practical Pathology

This session will introduce graduates to the principles of post mortem techniques across the farm species.

- Practical knowledge of the following systems and diseases in poultry:
 - Recognise key anatomical structures.
 - Recognise common pathological abnormalities.
- Be able to take samples for common further diagnostic tests:
 - Bacteriology.
 - Histology.
 - Virus isolation including tracheal swabs.
 - Blood sampling for serology.

Dr Rosie Allister has received the BVA Chiron Award and RCVS Impact Award for work on veterinary mental health. Rosie manages Vetlife Helpline, a 24 hour support service for everyone in the veterinary community. Her research, based at the University of Edinburgh, looks at veterinary mental health, wellbeing in transitions, and veterinary suicide prevention. She has written and spoken extensively about veterinary mental health in the UK and internationally.

He subsequently set up Farm Post Mortems to offer a comprehensive gross post mortem service to give vets and farmers a cost-effective way of diagnosing disease and increasing livestock efficiency, therefore improving profit margin.

Stuart has a long history within the poultry and gamebird sector including lecturing at the Royal Vet College and the various Duchy colleges in Devon & Cornwall.
